Dear Friends,

Women Aware's stellar reputation in the field of domestic violence has its roots in compassion for those we serve. Our initiatives stem from barriers that our clients face as they negotiate safety for themselves and their children. These challenges resulted in a vision for supportive housing, batterer intervention, access to electronic restraining orders, and expansion of trauma services for children. Our commitment to cultural competency is further demonstrated in a diverse bilingual staff. In our progress, we have remained strong in core services while serving as a state leader in the domestic violence field.

Regardless of the worst economic downturn since the great depression, Woman Aware has continued to grow with a 37% increase in revenue as well as a 25% increase in requests for client services. Despite the economic challenges to our clients, the staff at Women Aware leveraged over one million dollars in client assistance.

Our commitment to continuous improvement remains strong. Alas, there is still much work to be done. Of course, we could not have accomplished all that we have without you. Our Work

All services at Women Aware are provided in English and Spanish

The year 2013 was a landmark one, with Women Aware launching two major new programs: the Permanent Supportive Housing Program and the Batterers Intervention Program.

Hotline

The Women Aware Hotline is the gateway to our services. Available 24 hours a day and 365 days a year, it provides crisis counseling and information about resources and referrals. Calls may be made anonymously and communication is kept confidential.

This year, we actively worked with the police to increase their usage of our hotline in order to more effectively and seamlessly connect domestic violence victims to our services.

In 2013, the Safe House introduced in-house, bi-lingual educational support groups for domestic violence survivors who reside there, as well as age-appropriate safety planning for children.

Permanent Supportive Housing

The Permanent Supportive Housing Program is a pioneering program – the first and only one of its kind in New Jersey. It is designed to provide affordable housing to victims of domestic violence and their children once their immediate crisis is over and they are ready to leave the Safe House. Case managers help to connect families to the full range of services that best fit their needs including counseling, entitlements, healthcare, education and training. The program's goal is to assist survivors to reach their fullest potential by providing innovative, community-based services that promote independent living.

The residential facility was remodeled, furnished and opened its doors in October, 2013.

HOUSING

Safe House

The Safe House is an emergency shelter in an undisclosed location, and the only one for domestic violence victims in Middlesex County. It is a 24-bed, handicap accessible house, staffed 24 hours, and provides shelter for up to ten families. It is a safe, home-like environment that offers women and children solace and comfort during a difficult time. The Safe House staff provides food, transportation, case management and advocacy, support groups, resources and referrals, and safety planning. We also offer activities like Trauma Sensitive Yoga, Homework Club, movie nights, and park outings.

COUNSELING

PALS (Peace: A Learned Solution)

Children's Counseling Program

PALS offers creative arts therapy for children (ages 3-12) victimized by domestic violence and supportive services to their families. Services for children include creative arts therapy sessions to help them recover from the effects of domestic violence. Services for adults include individual case management to help with seeking employment or education, financial and legal needs, applying for documentation papers, housing search assistance, and group counseling to build on parenting techniques and connect with other families who have shared similar experiences.

This year, we hired a dedicated art therapist, joining our existing movement and music therapists. This has been enthusiastically welcomed by children in the program.

Support Group

Support Groups at Women Aware offer victims of domestic abuse the company of other women who have experienced violence in their relationships, and strengthen the foundation of empowerment and freedom that survivors have already begun to build. The groups discuss topics such as the cycle of violence, gender roles, and signs of ongoing danger.

Batterers Intervention Program

The Batterers Intervention Program is a pilot program, part of an exclusive partnership with the Department of Children and Families, Division of Child Protection and Permanency (DCP&P). It offers group counseling for perpetrators of domestic abuse in the company of other men who have demonstrated violence in their relationships, covering topics that explore anger, jealousy and the cycle of abuse, while teaching coping skills such as handling criticism and expressing feelings.

In 2013, the program introduced 4 groups, including one conducted entirely in Spanish.

Legal Advocacy

Legal Advocates assists victims with exploring their options, understanding their legal rights, obtaining restraining orders, court preparation and court accompaniment. Free monthly Legal Clinics are offered for victims of domestic violence where family law attorneys are available to provide individual consultation.

This year, Legal Advocacy was able to provide four Safe House clients with a Temporary Restraining Order through the innovative Safe House to Court Video Conferencing Program.

Outreach and Community Education

Providing information about domestic abuse, its consequences and how to assist victims is an important tool for prevention. Our community education program provides professional domestic violence training to clergy, attorneys, law enforcement, school personnel, mental health providers, health care providers, court personnel, human services and corporations. Teen Aware, the teen dating violence prevention and education program, is designed for elementary, middle and high school students, college students, staff, youth groups and parents. This program also trains Domestic Violence Response Teams (DVRT) attached to

police departments around Middlesex County.

In 2013, we reached 1,643 students through our 'Teen Aware' trainings in high schools, in an effort to begin conversations about dating violence.

Domestic Violence Liaison

The Domestic Violence Liaison program is a collaborative effort to strengthen service coordination between Women Aware and New Jersey's Department of Children and Families, Division of Child Protection and Permanency (DCP&P) in Middlesex County. Working with child protective services is integral to our work because of the overlap between cases of domestic violence and child abuse. The role of the Liaisons is to consult with DCP&P staff throughout the processing of a domestic violence case, and to speak confidentially with clients about their situation, needs, and options. Liaisons are able to create a smooth transition for parents to learn about and access not just Women Aware's services, but other supportive services.

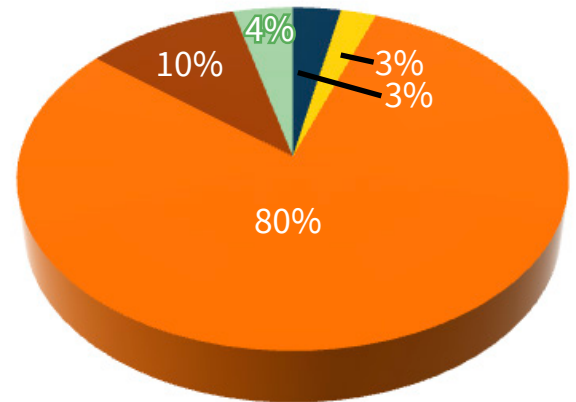
Another aspect of the Liaison's role is to promote long-term changes by increasing DCP&P staff's knowledge and understanding of domestic violence. In addition to the day-to-day consultations with case workers, the liaisons conduct trainings on identifying domestic violence and working with victims and abusers.

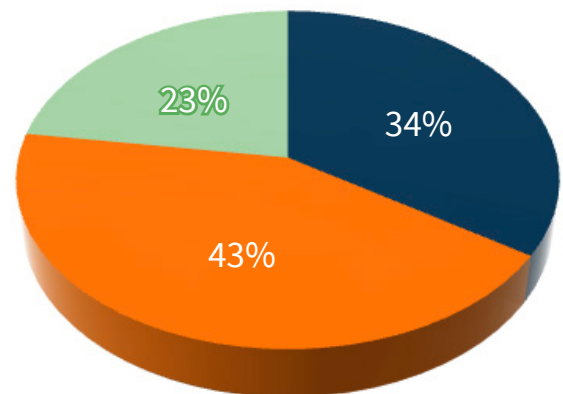
